Critical thinkers apply accepted criteria or conditions to their analyses. Inquisitive: Critical thinkers are curious by nature. Critical thinkers ask questions of what is going on around them and in a message. Critical thinkers want to know more and take action to learn more. Judicious: Critical thinkers are prudent in acting and

making judgments.

Critical Thinking & Reasoning: Logic and the Role of Arguments We will talk about good and bad arguments later. Before that, we need to be clear on what arguments are, and how to recognise them. Definition: An argument is a group of statements some of which, the premises, are offered in support of another statement, the conclusion.

What are arguments?

Given that some of what people say and do is not argumentative, one must be able to distinguish the arguments from other types of expression. Critical Thinking Worksite: Argument Identification

An argument can have any number of premises, but technically speaking there is one conclusion per argument. Thus, an argument splits into two distinct parts: 1. One or more premises offer evidence for the truth of the conclusion. 2. The conclusion is supported by the premise or premises. Here is an argument: All dogs are mammals. No mammals are birds.

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
