At the end of the portico on the left side of the courtyard, under the niche occupied by the weary Hercules, is a two-tone bas-relief plaque showing the outline of the so-called "she-mule", the famous female mule that, as commemorated in the Latin inscription above, "with her sacrifice, pulled and transported stone, marble, wood and columns", labouring for years on the site of Palazzo Pitti, during the works directed by Bartolomeo Ammannati.

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
