Knowledge Warning the patient that you have bad news may reduce the shock of disclosure. Give the patient and their friend/relative enough time and space to absorb the information and ask questions. If there is any doubt about the prognosis, explain this and the options for clarifying uncertainty. ...

Health care has changed since the end of the 1960s with the realisation that the patient-centred approach is key to the effective delivery of care (Bruera et al, 2000).

Breaking bad news in cancer care Part 2: practical skills...

It ' s important to break bad news in an appropriate setting: The discussion should occur in a comfortable, quiet and private room. Although this is not always possible, make sure you have at least some privacy and that the patient and family have somewhere to sit. Bad news should never be broken standing in a corridor!

BREAKING BAD NEWS TO PATIENTS OR NEXT-OF-KIN

Breaking bad news occurs throughout all clinical areas in the Trust. How this news is broken can affect a patient ' s understanding of their situation, satisfaction with care and psychological adjustment to their illness. The term ' bad news ' should be taken to mean any information about the patient ' s

Communicating the news of a patient ' s death to a relative can be likened to breaking bad news to a patient with a terminal diagnosis. However, although both are covered by the umbrella term " breaking bad news ", the finality of death means communicating the news of a terminal illness and news of death have significant differences.

When breaking bad news, it may be useful to remember the seven steps to good communication (Von Gunten et al, 2000): - Prepare for the discussion; - Establish what the patient and family know;

The development of best practice in breaking bad news to...

Breaking bad news is one element of patient-professional communication. Ideally all communications with patients (and their relatives/carers) should be delivered sensitively and in a manner and at a time that fits with their needs. The aim should be to establish a dialogue between the professional and the patient (and relatives/carers).

The role of the nurse in the process of breaking bad news...

The breaking of bad news was traditionally regarded to be the time when a doctor and nurse sat down with a patient and family members to provide information about, for example, a life-limiting diagnosis or a poor prognosis.
