Thyroid disorder (treatable) Life changes e.g. reaction to a bereavement, changes in an individual's day service / staff / support, retirement. As with all adults, advancing age also increases the chances a person with Down syndrome will develop Alzheimer's disease. According to the National Down Syndrome Society, about 30% of people with Down syndrome who are in their 50s have Alzheimer's dementia. About 50% of people with Down syndrome in their 60s have Alzheimer's dementia.

Alzheimer's Disease in People with Down Syndrome ...  
People with Down syndrome, also called trisomy 21, develop a syndrome of dementia that has the same characteristics of Alzheimer's disease that occurs in individuals without Down syndrome. The only difference is that Alzheimer's disease occurs much earlier in people with Down syndrome; patients with Down syndrome begin to have symptoms in their late 40s or early 50s.

Sundowning and dementia Sometimes a person with dementia will behave in ways that are difficult to understand more often in the late afternoon or early evening. This is known as 'Sundowning'.
