Symbolic interactionists interpret deviance through the following social theories: differential association theory (people learn deviance from the groups with whom they associate), control theory (people generally avoid deviance because of an effective system of inner and outer controls), and labeling theory (people are directed toward or away from deviance by the labels others pin on them).

Social control theory, developed by Travis Hirschi, is a type of functionalist theory that suggests deviance occurs when a person's or group's attachment to social bonds is weakened.

Sociology Theories of Deviance and Deviant Behavior

Travis Hirschi noted that these inner and outer restraints form a person's self control, which prevents acting against social norms. The key to developing self control is proper socialization, especially early in childhood. Children who lack this self control, then, may grow up to commit crimes and other deviant behaviors.

Deviance is behavior that violates social norms and arouses negative social reactions.

Social Control and the Relativity of Deviance

Control theory is a view of conformity and deviance that stresses the social bond between society and individuals. Deviant acts, which violate social norms, may appear attractive to individuals but the social bond is used to help individuals from going toward those attractive deviant acts because of the fear of not belonging.
