The Charpy impact test (Charpy V-notch test) is used to measure the toughness of materials under impact load at different temperatures! Test setup and test procedure. In the Charpy impact test, a notched specimen is abruptly subjected to bending stress. The specimen is usually 55 mm long and has a square cross-section with an edge length of 10 mm.

The Charpy impact test was invented in 1900 by Georges Augustin Albert Charpy (1865 – 1945), and it is regarded as one of the most commonly used test to evaluate the relative toughness of a material in a fast and economic way. The Charpy impact test measures the energy absorbed by a standard notched specimen while breaking under an impact load.

The Charpy impact specimens are produced as a bar containing a notch. The swinging arm of the impact tester provides the impact. The sample will fracture along the plane indicated by the red line below. The arm continues through after impacting and the height it swings to is a direct indication of the amount of energy absorbed during fracture.

The Charpy impact test, also known as the Charpy V-notch test, is a standardized high strain-rate test which determines the amount of energy absorbed by a material during fracture. Absorbed energy is a measure of the material's notch toughness. It is widely used in industry, since it is easy to prepare and conduct and results can be obtained quickly and cheaply.

Of these two, the type of cp (proof body) charpy type is the most used without a doubt. It is so used that the impact test is sometimes called "charpy" (pronounced with stronger sound in Y). IMPACT TESTING - ITU

The Charpy test measures the energy absorbed by a standard notched specimen while breaking under a three-point bending impact load. The most common method of measuring impact energy in steels today is the Charpy V-notch test (Fig. 2a). Other notch configurations (U-notch, keyhole, etc.) can be used.

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
