John Barth was born in Cambridge, Maryland, and briefly studied “Elementary Theory and Advanced Orchestration” at Juilliard before attending Johns Hopkins University, receiving a B.A. in 1951 and an M.A. in 1952 (for which he wrote a thesis novel, *The Shirt of Nessus*).

The Literature of Exhaustion is a 1967 essay by the American novelist John Barth sometimes considered to be the manifesto of postmodernism. The essay was highly influential and controversial. It depicted literary realism as a “used up” tradition; Barth's description of his own work, which many thought nailed a core trait of postmodernism, is “novels which imitate the form of a novel, by an author who imitates the role of Author”. Although John Barth's (1930 – ) novels have ensured his eminence among contemporary American writers, his short fictions have been no less influential or controversial. In addition to his novels, he published a collection of shorter works, *Lost in the Funhouse* (1968), the technical involutions of which plumb the nature of narrative itself and disrupt conventional relationships between teller and tale.

The Literature of Exhaustion In 1967, John Barth published a controversial essay in *The Atlantic* which amounts to a manifesto of postmodernism . The essay was called “The Literature of Exhaustion” and in it Barth proposed that the conventional modes of literary representation had been “used up,” their possibilities consumed through over use.

Barth has himself endorsed such a view of his literary output, above all in his two famous essays, “The Literature of Exhaustion” (1967) and “The Literature of Replenishment” (1980) and in his memoir/novel, *Once Upon a Time: A Floating Opera* (1994). Barth has always been highly interested in the materiality of fiction, asking questions about the transformation of storytelling as it has moved from oral culture to a text-based culture and, more recently, to hypertext.
